

Commerce City unveils fully electric waste and recycling fleet, leading sustainability in Colorado



CITY OFFICIALS, IN PARTNERSHIP WITH REPUBLIC SERVICES AND XCEL ENERGY, officially launched a fully electric fleet of recycling and waste collection vehicles at a ribbon-cutting on Tuesday, Jan. 13, marking a major milestone in Commerce City’s sustainability efforts and positioning the community as a regional leader in clean municipal services.

“Commerce City continues to lead by example when it comes to sustainability,” said Mayor Steve Douglas. “Being the first city in Adams County and the largest city in Colorado to adopt a fully electric collection fleet reflects our commitment to protecting public health while delivering essential services more efficiently, and putting our Sustainability Action Plan into practice.”

The all-electric fleet of McNeilus Volterra electric trucks is expected to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, cut operational noise, and improve air quality for residents. The vehicles also incorporate advanced safety features including 360-degree cameras, automated braking systems, lane-departure sensors and enlarged windshields for enhanced operator visibility.

Republic Services anticipates operating up to 19 electric vehicles locally by the end of 2026 as part of the rollout, thanks in part to infrastructure provided by Xcel Energy at its Commerce City hauling facility. Republic Services has the industry’s largest commitment to fleet electrification and operates North America’s largest electric recycling and waste collection fleet, with more than 150 EVs on the road today. E. 96th Avenue Widening Project: Road closures and construction updates



PROGRESS CONTINUES ON THE E. 96TH AVENUE Widening Project, working toward major improvements that will expand the roadway to four lanes from Chambers Road to Tower Road, add traffic signals, sidewalks, and multi-use paths, and upgrade utilities. Current project updates include:

- Telluride Street is closed just south of E. 96th Avenue through early February for installation of a water main. Detours are in place using Landmark Drive and E. 94th Way. Temporary traffic signals are in place at the Landmark Drive and Second Creek Plaza Drive intersections to improve safety and access to and from the neighborhoods south of 96th Avenue.
- Crews are actively working on the Second Creek bridge, storm sewer installation, and utility upgrades.
- Paving is complete in several segments, including areas near Landmark Drive, with additional paving planned as grading and utility work are finalized.
- Phase 1 began at the Landmark Drive intersection to advance the construction of the new traffic signal.
- The Arsenal Perimeter Trail near E. 96th Avenue remains closed, with a signed detour routed through the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge. The trail should re-open by late February.

Motorists should plan for continued construction activity, including temporary closures and shifting traffic patterns, through 2026. The full project is expected to be completed by the end of the year. For the latest updates, visit c3gov.com/96th.

2026 QCF nonprofit grant applications due Feb. 20

THE 2026 QUALITY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION (QCF) grant program provides grant opportunities each year for nonprofits that impact the quality of life of Commerce City residents. QCF grants provide funding for a wide variety of programs and services in the city, such as volunteer organizations, youth services, meals for the community, and more. Each organization can receive up to \$7,500 from the \$140,000 total fund to support its work in Commerce City. In 2025, the foundation awarded a total of 25 grants to local nonprofits.

- A 501(c)3 nonprofit in good standing with state and federal regulations

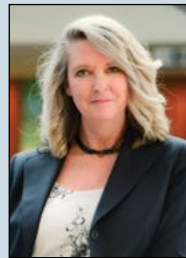

HAPPY NEW YEAR, EVERYONE. As we step into a new year, many families are tightening their budgets and carefully weighing needs versus wants. City government should do the same. My focus this year is simple and intentional: getting back to the basics and prioritizing what truly matters for the people of Commerce City. Good governance begins with meeting fundamental needs. That means safe roads and walkable sidewalks, reliable drainage, and above all - safe routes to our schools. These investments may not always grab headlines, but they form the backbone of a well-functioning city and directly impact quality of life.

One of the most pressing challenges we face is Commerce City’s estimated one billion dollars in economic leakage. Too many residents are forced to leave the city for everyday necessities such as groceries, household goods, and basic services. This costs families time and money and represents a major missed opportunity for our local economy. We must close these gaps, demanding new retail and commercial development in both the northern and southern parts of the city, including additional grocery stores. Residents have been clear - they are tired of driving elsewhere to meet basic needs, and that has to change.

Just as important is creating conditions where residents who live near jobs can also work and build careers within the city, rather than commuting elsewhere. Recreation and entertainment is another basic need that deserves continued focus. Investing in recreation and attracting entertainment opportunities for youth and families strengthens community ties, supports public health, and will help make Commerce City a place where people want to live and stay.

Transportation remains one of our biggest challenges. With limited corridors and light rail access confined to a small portion of the city, connectivity affects access to jobs, schools, and services. Addressing this will require practical solutions and long-term planning.

Finally, leadership matters. Technical knowledge leads to better decisions, but soft skills matter just as much. Effective leaders stay reflective, avoid being overly reactive, keep egos in check, and lead with humility, respect, and common decency.

To strengthen that connection, I will be launching monthly Coffee with the Mayor engagements this year. These informal gatherings will give residents the opportunity to ask questions, share concerns, and learn how city government works—directly and in plain language. Open dialogue matters, and staying connected to our community is a priority. I am always available to meet with you personally. My number is 720-379-6919.

This year, let’s focus on what matters most—back to basics, smart priorities, and leadership rooted in service. That’s how we move Commerce City forward.

Free Quarterly Bulk Pickup

Items that cannot fit inside your trash cart can be collected once per quarter at no extra charge. To know if your item meets the size and weight requirements or to schedule, call Republic Services at 303-286-1200 (Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.) This pickup must be scheduled with Republic Services. You can schedule additional bulk item pickups at any time for only \$21.75 per item.

Neighborhood Curbside Cleanup Days

Additionally, residents can participate in their Neighborhood Curbside Clean-Up Day. Each year, residential neighborhoods are divided into five areas for these events, with a different part of the city being serviced over five different Saturdays. All items should be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on the Saturday of your scheduled pick-up

- **March 28: All residents south of E. 88th Avenue and East of Highway 2**

2025: A year of progress, connection, and community

COMMERCE CITY HAD SO MUCH TO celebrate in 2025! From vibrant community events to major infrastructure investments and innovative public safety efforts, this year showcased the strength, resilience, and momentum of our city and the 70,000-plus people who call it home.

The city strengthened housing stability, sustainability, and equity efforts through the Advancing Commerce City Together (ACT) program, delivering housing assistance, essential services, programs, and community partnerships. Public safety saw major advancements, including a 31.5% reduction in auto thefts supported by new technology in the Police Department, and the launch of the Drone as First Responder (DFR) program. Infrastructure upgrades include recreation facilities such as CALU Park and numerous playground upgrades, and major roadway and capital improvement projects.

Public Works teams responded to snowstorms, improved roads and sidewalks, and launched the city's first in-house custodial team, while the Municipal Court and Human Resources supported residents and employees through high-quality service and innovation.

Community events remained a highlight, with more than 30 large-scale community events and thousands of residents participating in celebrations like the Memorial Day Parade, Fall Fest, Music in the Park, and more. The city expanded its digital reach with over 3.1 million social media views and strong engagement through the brand new website and this very newsletter!
