


Transportation & Access

Commerce City has grown around a network of major travel routes including freeways, the E-470 belt-way, several state highways, local streets, and railroads. Other important elements of the transportation system serving the city include transit service provided by the Regional Transportation District (RTD); a bicycle and pedestrian network that currently features 18 miles of regional trails; and the bordering Denver International Airport (DIA).

Transportation at a Glance

- Adjacent to DIA, the fifth busiest airport in the nation.
- The Western and Northern border of Denver International Airport (DIA) – making it the center of the new aerotropolis corridor.
- The convergence of several major arteries including I-70, I-270, I-76, Highway 85, Highway 2, E-470 and Peña Blvd.
- Located between two future RTD FasTracks corridors
- 10 min. from downtown Denver
- 20 min. from the Denver Tech Center
- 30 min. from Boulder & the Rocky Mountains



Denver International Airport

- 5th-busiest airport in the United States.
- 11th-busiest airport in the World.
- 6 runways (longest is 16,000 feet)
- 16 commercial airlines
- Over 52 million passengers per year!
- More than 170 non-stop destinations
- 19 non-stop international destinations.
- Over 547 million pounds of air cargo per year.
