Council follow-up

Resolution of action items or requests from previous meetings.

Snow Removal Update

Public Works department employees have been working 12-hour shift rotations around the clock since Saturday. Crews have applied approximately 228 tons of Ice-Slicer and plowed 5,451 lane miles to date. Staff is currently cleaning up [Priority 1 streets](#) and should have them plowed to pavement before the end of Monday. Most of the city's [Priority 2 and 3 streets](#) are still snow packed. However, they have been treated with Ice-Slicer and should be plowed to pavement before the end of the day Tuesday. The current plan is to have the day crew stay out until 4 p.m. tonight and have the night crew come in and stay as long as needed. Staff is also preparing for Wednesday's predicted storm, securing additional materials.

City trash and recycling update

Beginning today, Feb. 23, residents will start to receive their new trash and recycling cans. It will take approximately five weeks to deliver the estimated 29,000 containers throughout the city. Container delivery will be a Monday through Saturday operation.

Due to the mass amount of people this transition affects, we expect to receive a high volume of calls and inquiries during this period. The welcome packet was mailed Jan. 29 to approximately 14,500 residences. Approximately 100 phone calls were received at public works between Feb. 2-20; most of these were related to general inquiries regarding service, containers, yard waste, additional cans, can sizes, can placement and storage, and similar.

The city also held three public outreach events (one at each King Soopers and a third at the senior center) with city and Waste Management staff present to answer questions and provide additional information. The questions received were consistent with call themes to date. Staff also received many compliments and positive comments. At least a couple hundred contacts were made at each event held at Kings Soopers. Approximately 50 seniors participated in the outreach event held at the senior center, and all comments were positive from that group. The 96-, 64-, and 32-gallon containers were on display, and the majority of seniors found the 96-gallon totes manageable. Those who inquired about smaller totes were informed that they would be available beginning May 1.

Councilman Amador voiced concerns regarding drainage issues and ice damming between 7260 E. 73rd Ave and 7280 E. 73rd Ave.

Staff has evaluated the concern and has not identified any issues that require remedy. There is an existing storm drain inlet in the street between the two properties. The line does not appear to be clogged; however, water was not draining at the time. Since these homes face north, snow and ice melting will not occur as rapidly as a southern-facing property. At the time of observation, all ice had melted away. Staff will continue to monitor the area to determine if any measures are needed to clear the inlet.

Subject: Non-certified recruitment program

Date: Feb. 19, 2015

Throughout the month of March, the Commerce City Police Department will begin another non-certified recruitment for police officer candidates. During this recruitment we will be specifically targeting Commerce City residents to join our police department and become police officers. We are especially interested in bi-lingual candidates.

We have reserved up to five seats for successful applicants to attend the Adams County Sheriff's Office Police Academy. During the 20-week training, tuition and equipment are provided by the City and recruits will be hired by the City in a Police Recruit Position and paid an hourly rate of \$18. Individuals must successfully complete the academy, and pass the state certification prior to being appointed as a probationary police officer.

To be eligible individuals must:

- Be at least 21 years of age;
- Have a high school diploma or GED;
- Be able to perform all physical demands of the job as stipulated in the job description; and
- Be a United States citizen or possess proper I-9 documentation; also must be able to communicate effectively in written and spoken English;
- Be a Commerce City resident, City employee, or contracted employee or volunteer for the City of Commerce City and
- Commit to 3 years of service by signing an agreement with the City

This new recruitment strategy enables the police department to continue building partnerships with the community, hire qualified police officer candidates, affords additional employment opportunities and assists in building an organization that better reflects the community we serve. This unique opportunity will allow the police department to hire residents who have an

interest in serving their community and is designed to provide an opportunity for residents to become qualified to serve as police officers without the costly expenses associated with law enforcement training. Successful candidates will commit to the department's core values: trust, respect, excellence, leadership, and restraint, and must demonstrate exceptional character.

There is an orientation to Policing and the Commerce City Police Department scheduled for March 18, 2015 from 6-7 p.m., at the civic center to provide in-depth details about the program, requirements, hiring process and the employment agreement.

Welcome!

Doesn't it feel like spring, with abnormally warm weather this month? Even though we are only a few short weeks away from spring, before you know it we will have clearing equipment in our guideway to start removing the old rail and start building the infrastructure to the project—bridges. The countdown to construction begins now.

It is important we get you updates in a timely matter, especially as construction will be occurring throughout different parts of the line. You can find a variety of the latest information on the [North Metro Rail Line website](#). You can also identify places along the line for area-specific updates. This will allow us to send construction notices to people directly affected by construction rather than sending them to our general mailing list. You can do this on our [sign up page](#) by checking the boxes for your geographical areas of interest.

News along the line

Building a Bridge

Construction on the North Metro Rail Line has begun and bridges will be some of the first things built. There are three main phases in bridge construction: early work, structural work, and track and systems work.

Phase 1 of bridge construction includes surveying, applying for permits, establishing traffic management plans, clearing the ground around the construction area and removing all vegetation and debris, preparing areas where equipment and supplies can be stored and utility relocations. Phase 2 includes the structural work. During this phase the foundations are poured, followed by the construction of the abutments (walls that hold up the ends of the bridge), piers (the structures that hold up the middle of the bridge) and girders (the horizontal elements that sit on top of the abutments and piers). Then the deck is poured (the top of the bridge) and the painting and finishes take place.

During the final phase of bridge construction, the track and systems work is completed. This work includes placing the rails, installing the signal and communications systems and connecting to the electrification system including overhead contact wires and the power supply system.

The first two bridges to start construction will be over 120th Avenue and the Skyway Bridge. Regional Rail Partners will be bidding out these bridges to sub-contractors, who will dictate the specific construction schedule. The 120th Avenue Bridge will travel over 120th Avenue at Claude Court. This bridge is scheduled to go out for bid this spring. Construction on the bridge will take approximately six months.

The Skyway Bridge travels from just north of Riverside Cemetery to south of the future 72nd Avenue station in Commerce City. It will be the longest bridge in Colorado at 9,553.5 feet long, almost two miles. Construction is scheduled to begin during late spring/early summer of this year. Construction will take approximately two years.

Activities along the line

North Metro Update

- The design of the North Metro Rail Line is approaching 90 percent completion
- Geotechnical drilling to determine existing site conditions continues along the rail corridor on an as needed basis and should be completed by mid-March
- Crews continue potholing for existing utilities along the boundaries of the project
- Utility relocations to accommodate construction of the North Metro Rail Line began this month. These relocations will be completed by the individual utility companies including Xcel Energy, Comcast and CenturyLink. The project has identified approximately 150 utilities that need to be relocated.
- Early drainage work near 86th and Welby Road could begin in early March. This work will include drainage upgrades as well as removal of existing track.

Suncor Update

- Pipeline construction along North Metro right-of-way is 99 percent complete.

Subject: 2015 General Assembly Week 5 Legislative Report

Date: February 23, 2015

After taking off Presidents Day, the General Assembly was busy last week moving bills through committee and onto the House and Senate floors. With the next set of deadlines around the corner, both houses will attempt to clear as many bills as possible off their respective calendars in anticipation of the Long Bill (budget bill) that will be introduced later in March. Today's snow day also required moving some controversial bills to later in the week.

This week, one of the city's top priorities – red light cameras – will receive its first hearing. To date, 427 have been introduced; the Commerce City is actively tracking approximately 68 bills for possible direct or indirect impacts on the city, its employees, businesses and residents.

The city's position, consistent with its [approved legislative principles](#), is in parentheses. SPECIFIC LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- **Owner-Occupied, Multifamily Housing:** SB 15-177 was introduced Feb. 10 and Councilman Douglas represented Commerce City at a press conference to make the announcement. The bill has yet to be calendared. The city will need a council member to testify on this bill when it is heard in committee.
- **Urban Renewal & Tax Increment Financing:** SB 15-135 passed out of committee 6-1 on Feb. 10, thanks to Councilman Amador's testimony. During committee, the sponsors stated their willingness to have a meeting among the parties to consider amendments, so second reading has yet to be scheduled. Colorado Counties indicated that Speaker Hullinghorst will carry their bill on this topic, which has yet to be introduced.
- **Public Safety Tools: Photo Red Light Cameras:** Commander Baker will represent Commerce City Wednesday, testifying in opposition to HB 15-1098. The bill will be heard

in the House Transportation Committee beginning at 1:30 p.m. Feb. 25, 2015. Testimony can be heard [online](#) and the final position paper also is [available](#).

OTHER BILLS OF INTEREST

- **HB 15-1202, Allow Reissue of Expired License (Oppose)**

In current law, a liquor licensee has 90 days beyond the expiration of the license to renew the license – otherwise, the licensee must start from the beginning with an application for a new license, as if it were an entirely new business. Only a very small percentage of licensees ever let their license lapse beyond 90 days and this bill would allow that to occur between 90 and 180 days after expiration - at the sole discretion of the local licensing authority - and would allow a penalty and late fees to be collected by both the local and state authorities. The bill is scheduled for a committee hearing on February 26.

- **HB 15-1271, Local Input on Salesrooms (Support)**

This CML-initiated legislation gives local licensing authorities input into salesrooms and tap rooms for distillers, vintners, and brewers was finally introduced after significant negotiations with stakeholders. The simple purpose of the legislation is to allow the appropriate involvement of the local licensing authority when manufacturers and wholesalers operate salesrooms or tap rooms for on-premise consumption of purchased alcohol beverages. This creates parity with dually-licensed establishments (bars, restaurants, brew pubs, etc.)

The basic goals of the legislation are:

- Create a clear definition of "sales room" to make clear that covered licenses/additional sales rooms are for on-premise consumption which triggers involvement in siting and operational issues by local licensing authorities.
- Require local licensing authority input for any new manufacturer or wholesaler location (licensed premises or any additional sales rooms) that will have alcohol beverages available for on-premise consumption.
- Require existing manufacturers or wholesales selling alcohol beverages for onsite consumption (whether on the licensed premises or any additional sales rooms) to notify the state authority of the sales room's existence.
- Give clear authority to the State LED to promulgate rules related to sales rooms.
- Allow local licensing authorities to request the State LED to take appropriate action on the license of any manufacturer or wholesaler for "good cause" (defined in statute) or violations of liquor laws in their respective sales rooms.

The bill has not yet been scheduled for a hearing.

- **SB 15-006, Prohibit Forfeitures Without Criminal Conviction (Oppose)**

Under certain circumstances, a forfeiture action may proceed without a criminal conviction of the person named in the forfeiture action. SB 15-006 repeals the provisions authorizing a forfeiture action to proceed without a conviction, unless it is part of a settlement agreed upon by all parties. The bill gives the party who had items seized the right to a preliminary hearing or writ of replevin to determine the validity of the seizure or to require the return of the property.

Additionally, the bill prohibits law enforcement agencies in Colorado from participating or assisting in a federal forfeiture action unless the property subject to forfeiture has a value of greater than \$50,000, excluding the value of any controlled substance. The bill also requires that any proceeds of a federal forfeiture action received by a law enforcement agency must be credited to the state general fund. This bill has a potentially profound negative affect on local law enforcement agencies. The attorney general, Department of Public Safety, sheriffs, and police chiefs have also raised concerns. The North Metro Task Force will speak, of which the city is a part of.

- **HB 15-1007, County Special Marijuana Sales Tax (Formerly Opposed)**

The house committee adopted the bill with an amendment that clarifies that counties can collect county special sales taxes only from businesses in unincorporated areas, unless the city and the county establish an IGA. This is consistent with the spirit and intent of Amendment 64 as implemented by HB 13-1318 - and is absolutely necessary to prevent double-taxation and tax inequity. An IGA is the only way counties would be able to collect a tax from a business in a municipality, since the county lacks any business relationship with municipal businesses.

During the hearing, Colorado Counties erroneously argues that since county general sales taxes (collected by the state) apply countywide, that the same should be true of a self-collected special sales tax. The assertion could lead to absurd results, including a county that prohibits marijuana sales applying a countywide special sales tax that would tax businesses only in municipalities that have approved sales. More significantly, it flies in the face of painstaking efforts by municipalities and the broader business community to simplify Colorado's sales tax complexities and not add to them. Finally, over taxation of marijuana is already a concern, as it relates to luring people to the tax-free black market.

While the City and CML supports the legislation with the amendment, we will oppose the legislation without it for reasons that go beyond marijuana taxation. Establishing a precedent of allowing any county special sales tax to encroach on municipal businesses without any intergovernmental agreement is not a tax policy for Colorado that CML can ever support. Local governments should tax what they license and work with each other on addressing local impacts. However, the bill is now stalled on the House 2nd reading calendar because of an 11th hour objection to the bill by House leadership.

- **SB 15-059, Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (Oppose)**

SB 15-059 permits law enforcement to use an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) under certain circumstances. The circumstances listed in the bill are not expansive enough to allow law enforcement to use this technology to the best of their ability – especially when no civilian guidelines exist. There are myriad emergencies and disasters in which this technology may be used that may are not contained in the bill. While the privacy of citizens is important, we would rather look at this issue from the perspective of limited restrictions versus constrained permissions. Local and state emergency responders need the flexibility to determine when the use of a UAV is appropriate. While amendments are being proposed, we are still concerned there may still be circumstances not listed in the bill when law enforcement may need these devices.
