Council follow-up

Resolution of action items or requests from previous meetings.

Sales and Use Tax Bond refunding saves city more than \$4 million

The Series 2005 and 2006 Sales and Use Tax Bonds were refunded March 12, 2015. The result was a substantial 7.5 percent savings or \$4,071,000. The average coupon rate is 4.36%. The entire amount of the 2005 and 2006 bonds were refunded. The new Series 2015 annual bond payments are consistent with the previous bond payments and the maturity schedule remains the same as the retired Series 2005 and 2006 bonds, with the final bonds maturing in 2036. The closing will take place the beginning of April.

Garbage & Recycling program update

Waste Management has finished delivering all of the new garbage & recycling containers throughout the City. Additional containers and missed addresses are still being completed. Staff continues to work through the new trash service transition to assist citizens and work with Waste Management staff. Attached is a memo summarizing the number and type of calls received to date, as well as an update on the program's efforts and issues.

104th Avenue, Phase 3B (US-85 to Lima Street) construction update

Traffic will be switched over to the eastbound (southern) lanes sometime in late April. A project update memo is attached.

Councilmember Douglas stated the asphalt pavement patch on 104th Avenue, west of Potomac Street has settled and would like to see it repaired

Several concrete panels in this area were severely cracked, which allowed moisture to enter the subgrade. The moisture eventually led to the subgrade washing out, forcing the pavement to sink. Staff removed the sunken panels March 9 and backfilled the area with road base. Asphalt was installed March 11. The curb has now settled, as has the asphalt patch. Streets division staff performed repairs on March 27. These panels and several others located on 104th Avenue will be permanently repaired as part of the 2015 Pavement Maintenance Program this summer.

Councilmember Amador expressed concern about the condition of the railroad crossing on Vasquez Boulevard, south of 53rd Avenue

This crossing is a spur off of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) line. Staff notified both CDOT and the BNSF maintenance groups about the need to evaluate and repair the crossing.

Olive Street Speed Humps update

Speed humps on Olive Street, north and south of 64th Avenue, have been installed at the prescribed height. The goal of speed humps is not to stop traffic but, instead, to slow drivers down to the speed limit of 25 mph and the new humps achieve that. Staff received several positive comments from citizens on the effect of the humps on speeds.

Mayor Ford requested information on planned repairs for 60th Avenue, Holly Street and 56th Avenue 60th Avenue from Quebec Parkway to just west of Glencoe Street (back side of WalMart) and Holly Street from 58th Avenue to 60th Avenue are planned for a mill & overlay in 2015. 56th Avenue, from Quebec Parkway to Eudora Street, will be crack sealed and receive a slurry seal; the same techniques that were used last year on Quebec Parkway. Staff is still finalizing the areas and repair quantities in residential areas. An update to City Council on the 2015 activities is planned for May 18.

Gravel Road Grading

At the March 2 council meeting, Mr. Glenn Murray expressed concerns about the condition of gravel roads in the city, especially 108th Avenue and Potomac Street. A summary of the city's gravel road maintenance program is provided below. Staff also shared this schedule with Mr. Murray.

Gravel Road Grading Program

Road grading consists of using a motor grader to restore the driving surface and drainage attributes to gravel or unpaved roads. The operator will remove washboards, potholes and other irregularities by cutting the surface of the road or filling them with existing material moved back and forth across the road. Additional gravel material will be placed on a road, when necessary.

The effectiveness of road grading is dependent on a number of factors, including the amount of moisture present in the road base, weather conditions, and speed of vehicles using the road. Commerce City schedules grading based on the volume of traffic using the roads. All work is subject to good weather.

The last of the 29,000 trash and recycling totes were delivered during the week of March 23. Waste Management has mailed a postcard notifying 7,000 residents that their service day will change. The new route changes will be effective the week of March 30th. Waste Management previously notified the city that only 2,500 residences would be affected by a route change. These service day changes are intended to maximize route optimization, while minimizing the time trash trucks are on city roads.

Staff has been tracking the number of calls received from citizens with issues about program implementation. To date, 182 calls for service have been received. This represents approximately 1.26% of customers, (182 of 14,475 accounts). Below is a summary of the nature of the calls from the public to city staff between January 26th and March 26th:

Of these 182 contacts, 37 contacted the Waste Management call center and were given incorrect information and were told to call the City. The city has notified our contact at Waste Management about their call center staff not being properly trained and giving out incorrect information.

Many residents have mentioned their neighborhood association previously required them to purchase a can from Waste Management and want to know what to do with it. Staff has reiterated that it wasn't the city that required them to make those purchases and that they have several options:

- Use it as a second can for additional trash (service fees still apply).
- Get rid of it. WM will pick it up at no charge during the month of April.
- Use it for storage or other personal uses.
- Give it to a friend, relative, etc. who lives in another community.
- Sell it privately to someone.

Some residents have called in to let staff know they did not receive their cans on the scheduled delivery week. Staff is working on a case by case basis to verify addresses, confirm they are eligible for the program, and to get totes delivered as necessary.

Extra household trash and yard waste does not qualify as a large item pick-up. Complaints being made are that there is not nearly enough room in the 96-gallon can, so staff has relayed the following options:

- Increase recycling efforts to free up space in the waste container.
- Purchase additional can service from Waste Management.
- Install a mulching blade on the lawn mower.

Waste Management is trying to charge a \$50.00 delivery fee to residents who order additional containers & service. The City does not believe this is consistent with the contract and has sent a letter to Waste Management telling them to cease charging this delivery fee. To date, the City has not received a response.

The Garbage & Recycling Assistance Service Program (GRASP) has been created to help customers who are unable to move their totes from the house to the curb due to physical inability. Residents interested in the program should contact Public Works at 303-289-8150 to learn more about the eligibility requirements. To date, two citizens have registered for this program.

Waste Management has also begun to track the number of calls they've received. From March 1 through March 26, they've documented 73 calls. The majority of these were related to missed pickups or containers not delivered or removed. Waste Management has distributed nearly 2,000 service can tags at the time of pickup. The most common issues are can placement and leaving items next to containers to be disposed of or recycled. These issues are primarily happening in the older neighborhoods.

The Contractor, Zak Dirt, has completed approximately \$11.75M of work and is more than 60% complete. The original contract identified a completion date of January 27, 2016. The current contract completion deadline is March 11, 2016. The deadline was extended due to the addition of a water line required by the South Adams Water & Sewer District (SACWSD) and weather days. However, the contractor is anticipating completion of the project in late-2015.

Recent Accomplishments:

- ✓ Placement of girders for the eastbound bridge over the O'Brian Canal.
- ✓ Installation of box culvert extensions for the Little Burlington Ditch under 104th Avenue.
- ✓ Placement of concrete pavement at the connection of Florence Street between 104th Avenue and 106th Avenue.
- ✓ Paving of various business driveways along 104th Avenue.
- ✓ Completion of the water line from Havana Street to Joliet Street.
- ✓ Sidewalk paving along south side of the roadway.
- ✓ Traffic signal pole installation at UPRR and Florence Street.

Planned Work in the next few months:

- Completion of eastbound bridge over O'Brian Canal.
- Install storm sewer on Havana Street north of 104th Ave which will require full closure of Havana Street between 104th Avenue and Havana Court. The new Florence Street connection will be used as the detour route.
- Traffic will be shifted onto the new pavement on the south side of the roadway.

Issues:

- **Traffic safety concerns**

The Police Department has expressed concerns about the clarity of the traffic work zone and the cleanliness of the delineators and barrels. Staff has been working with the contractor to make improvements.

- **Bridge joint deterioration**

Staff has received a number of complaints regarding potholes on either end of the existing bridge over I-76. This is the result of paving adjacent to the expansion joints and CDOT plows scraping the patching materials away during snow removal operations. The contractor, CDOT and the City are discussing this issue to determine if there is a more permanent repair that can be done.

- **O'Brian Canal work**

There is a significant amount of work within the O'Brian Canal that cannot be completed unless the canal is dry. This work includes demolition of the existing box culvert, grading and lining the canal. It was anticipated that the contractor would need two separate 10-day dry periods in order to complete the work. The owner of the canal, Farmers Reservoir and Irrigation Company (FRICO) cannot provide any reliable dates of when, or even if, the canal will be dry within the contract period. Historically we have seen 2 to 3 dry periods over the course of a year, however, there is little or no advanced notice of when a dry period will occur. Staff is exploring the possibility of obtaining CDOT approval to close 104th Avenue at the O'Brian Canal if a dry period were to occur during the time that the eastbound bridge is under construction. The duration of the full closure cannot be determined at this time because it would depend upon the status of construction at the time of the closure, however, the current estimate is 2 to 3 weeks.

With only 38 days left in the session, Friday saw an additional 23 bills introduced, including SB 15-234, the 2015-16 Long Appropriations Bill, which sets aside about \$10M to fund pending legislation. To date, a total of 572 bills/concurrent resolutions have been introduced; Commerce City is tracking approximately 103 bills for possible direct or indirect impacts on the city, its employees, businesses and residents.

Last week at the Joint Budget Committee (JBC), Sen. Pat Steadman (D-Denver), outlined a proposed approach to allow the State of Colorado to retain marijuana special sales tax revenue collected under Proposition AA. Prop AA, approved overwhelmingly by voters in November 2013, enacted the 15 percent excise tax alluded to in Amendment 64, as well as a 10 percent special sales tax on retail marijuana sales.

During the last legislative session, the JBC became aware that an obscure provision of the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR) would require a refund of all of the taxes collected out of state's General Fund. TABOR requires any tax increase to estimate what the new total fiscal year spending will be upon passage and establishes that estimate as the new fiscal year spending limit. At the time, forecasters were not able to accurately predict the growth in the economy, and the state exceeded that limit. Ironically, the estimate of total sales and excise taxes proved to be higher than what is estimated to be collected by the end of the fiscal year.

The JBC is reserving \$58 million for a Prop AA TABOR refund that will occur unless voters approve a ballot question to retain the revenue. Sen. Steadman's proposed bill would put that question on the ballot, but the bill also will have to explain a mechanism for a one-time refund that is completely different from a normal TABOR refund. For initial consideration, Sen. Steadman proposed a refund mechanism broken into three pieces. First, refunding to cultivators all of the excise tax collected for the fiscal year. Second, a sales tax credit against all Coloradans state income tax return. Finally, a temporary state special sales tax reduction to 0.1 percent until the proper amount of the refund is reached.

The bill also includes language that pays back the local share back of state special sales tax money (15 percent of the total) already distributed to local governments with reductions of future share back dollars. This would be in lieu of asking local governments to write checks to

the state, an approach to which CML likely would not object. The bill also would restore money to the General Fund out of future tax collections to pay back sales tax money used for the refund.

Last, the bill explains how the \$58 million will be used if voters approve retention of the revenue. This part of the bill is clearly for discussion, but Sen. Steadman has put some thought into the proposal. He suggests transferring \$40 million to school capital construction, in addition to the excise tax dollars already flowing to the designated grant program and the remainder available for “ordinary spending.”

There are other aspects related to future tax rates and related provisions that may ultimately be part of the introduced measure, which is not expected for at least two weeks.

SPECIFIC LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- **Owner-Occupied, Multifamily Housing:** SB 177 (construction defects reform) will be heard on second reading sometime after the Senate completes work on the budget. Speaker Hullinghorst is also working to introduce an affordable housing package of legislation.
- **Urban Renewal & Tax Increment Financing:** SB 15-135 was again laid over for second reading in the Senate. Proponents are waiting for another urban renewal bill to be introduced by Speaker Hullinghorst.
- **Photo Red Light Cameras:** Still waiting to calendar HB 15-1098 to the Appropriations Committee. The House is looking to introduce legislation to have the state department of transportation study the issue.

OTHER BILLS OF INTEREST

- **Law Enforcement Reform.** Several law enforcement reform bills were introduced after weeks of speculation on what the legislature might be asked to consider. Many of the bills are bipartisan and the house bills will be heard this week. CML currently is working with

our chiefs of police and other stakeholders to determine positions and requests for amendments, if necessary.
