Council follow-up

Resolution of action items or requests from previous meetings.

Undergrounding of overhead electrical lines on Highway 2

As a part of Commerce City's Highway 2 Widening project, Xcel Energy, through their subcontractor Sturgeon Electric, will be working over the next two months to install underground electric lines and remove the overhead lines starting April 18. Work will take place in two areas: 1) between 88th Avenue and 96th Avenue and 2) from 77th Avenue to Quebec Street. A few poles will need to remain in place to serve adjacent properties or feed lines across Highway 2.

Xcel has not scheduled any planned power outages for residents or business owners, but will reach out directly in the event they need to shut off power. Temporary shoulder closures are anticipated along Highway 2 to complete this work, with some minimal closures to private drives. Xcel or Sturgeon Electric will coordinate with any business owners or residents prior to a closure occurring.

City Attorney Search

City Council directed staff to procure the services of an executive search firm to assist with the recruitment for a new city attorney. Staff issued a Request for Proposals consistent with the city's procurement guidelines and seven organizations responded. [Strategic Government Resources](#) (SGR) was selected as the preferred consultant and staff is finalizing the contract and proposed schedule. A future study session will be scheduled with SGR to facilitate a discussion about city council's desired candidate profile and key skill requirements.

The 'Train to the Plane' arrives April 22

One of the most anticipated rail line openings in Denver history happens April 22.

The University of Colorado A Line is 23 miles of commuter rail that will make local, domestic and international travel easier than ever. The new line will offer easy, affordable and reliable connections between downtown Denver, Denver International Airport, and the communities along I-70.

From Union Station to DIA, the ride will take 37 minutes with stops at six stations. Trains will depart every 15 minutes for the majority of the day. Travelers driving to stations along the line will find 4,329 parking spaces at six of the stations. And, it's only \$9 from anywhere in the metro Denver region. Discount fares are available for seniors 65+, students ages 6-19, Medicare recipients and individuals with disabilities.

Stations and parking spaces located along the University of Colorado A Line are:

- Union Station (17th & Wynkoop - downtown Denver). Train is at Platform 1
- 38th & Blake St. - 200 parking spaces
- 40th & Colorado Blvd. - 200 parking spaces
- Central Park (in the community of Stapleton) - 1,500 parking spaces
- Peoria (near I-70) - 550 parking spaces
- 40th Avenue & Airport Blvd•Gateway Park - 1,079 parking spaces
- 61st & Pena Blvd. - 800 private parking spaces with fees not like RTD Park-n-Rides
- Denver International Airport - parking at multiple lots, pricing determined by DIA

[The University of Colorado A Line](#) is part of the RTD FasTracks Eagle P3 project, the nation's first full public-private partnership for transit. Local RTD taxes combined with a \$1.03 billion federal grant and \$450 million from Denver Transit Partners, the 34-year concessionaire that will build, operate and maintain the trains, make up the \$2.3 billion project.

While residents in the region and international travelers will soon be taking the University of Colorado A Line to Denver International Airport, there’s another famous ‘A’ train worth noting. 

Take the ‘A’ Train is a jazz standard made famous by Duke Ellington and written by Billy Strayhorn in 1939. The composition became Ellington’s signature tune. It was first recorded Jan. 15, 1941, and the title refers to the then-new A subway service through New York City, which at that time, ran from eastern Brooklyn up into Harlem and northern Manhattan.

Ellington offered Strayhorn a job and gave him money to travel from Pittsburgh to New York City. He wrote directions for him on how to get to his house by subway that began, “Take the A Train.” The rest is history.

Ridership up 45% in first three months

RTD's BRT service, the Flatiron Flyer, exceeds expectations



The Flatiron Flyer, RTD's new bus rapid transit service, which began Jan. 3, is carrying an average of 14,428 passengers per weekday—that's an increase of 45 percent compared to ridership along the U.S. 36 corridor in August 2015—serving Denver, Westminster, Broomfield, Louisville, Superior and Boulder.

The Flatiron Flyer service has six all-stop and express routes that replaced the prior bus routes. The BRT service runs every 3-15 minutes, depending on time of day and location. In addition to more frequency, the Flatiron Flyer has increased weekday trips to 92 and increased weekend trips to 42.

The Flatiron Flyer provides 18 miles of high-frequency bus service between Boulder and Denver. This bus rapid transit service operates in a combination of the newly constructed express lanes, the general purpose lanes, and starting May 1, on the shoulder of U.S. 36.

Also, U.S. 36 now has overhead signage which displays real-time highway conditions, allowing buses and other vehicles to move into alternative lanes to avoid traffic delays.

Bus on shoulder operations on U.S. 36 begin May 1

Beginning May 1, RTD's Flatiron Flyer buses on U.S. 36 will have another tool to provide frequent and reliable service to its passengers during times of traffic congestion with the start of bus-on-shoulder operations.

Buses can operate on the shoulder only under certain conditions:

- The traffic speed in the general purpose lanes is less than 35 mph—any time of day.
- The bus cannot exceed the speed of general purpose traffic by more than 15 mph, with the maximum speed being 35 mph.

Private vehicles must remain in the general purpose lanes, but broken down vehicles and emergency responders can still use the shoulder.

For now, you will only see buses on the shoulder of U.S. 36. However, thanks to recent legislation, it could be added to other highways, if work is done to expand the shoulders.

Subject: 2016 General Assembly Week 11 Legislative Report

Date: April 18, 2016

With only 18 working days left in the session, several key issues remain before the General Assembly – and some have yet to be introduced. Telecom issues took center stage this week, as legislation on extent of the authority of the Public Utilities Commission to regulate 911 services was heard in the Senate. Another bill that passed the Senate purports to allow broadband expansion in rural Colorado by giving the option of a tax break to companies that have chosen against investing in rural Colorado.

We are still anticipating legislation that would alter the marijuana and liquor law landscape, from allowing onsite consumption at retail stores with local approval, to beer, wine and spirits in grocery stores.

To date 634 bills have been introduced and Commerce City is [tracking 82 bills](#) for possible direct or indirect impacts on the city, its employees, businesses and residents.

SPECIFIC LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- **Owner-Occupied, Multifamily Housing.** Nothing has been introduced to date.
- **Urban Renewal and Tax Increment Financing.** SB 16-177, which addresses consensus-supported fixes to last year's urban renewal bill, was approved by the Senate last week and heads to the house.
- **Photo Red Light Cameras.** HB 16-1231, was amended to outright ban, and a motion to adhere failed in the House last week. A conference committee is scheduled for April 22.

OTHER LEGISLATION OF INTEREST

- **HB 16-1309, Right to Counsel (Oppose)**

HB 16-1309 was heard in the Senate State Veterans and Military Affairs Committee on Wednesday and amended to allow right to counsel from the State Public Defender's Office within municipal courts. The bill will be heard in the Senate Finance Committee on Tuesday.

- **HB 16-1311, Court Orders Requiring Monetary Amounts (Oppose)**

When HB 16-1311 passed House Judiciary there was an assumption that the concerns of the opponents would be addressed. Unfortunately, the only concerns fully addressed were those by the Attorney General's office. CML is seeking amendments to preserve the municipal court's ability to issue warrants for failure to appear. It passed the House and will be heard in the Senate Judiciary Committee next Wednesday.

- **SB 16-183, Clarification of PUC Authority over 9-1-1 (Oppose)**

SB 16-183 addresses the extent of the Public Utilities Commission's (PUC) jurisdiction over VOIP and wireless portions of 9-1-1 calls. The legislation comes out of concerns the telecom industry has over proposed PUC rules. While CML and the City is not interested in getting involved in a turf war between the PUC and the telecom industry, we do have concerns with the legislation on behalf of our citizens and public safety community. First, we want to ensure - no matter the technology used - that 9-1-1 calls reach the answering point. Second, there needs to be a "Colorado solution" to ensure that any issues in local exchanges can be dealt with quickly and efficiently. The industry has said that they are already regulated at the federal level by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). CML is not convinced that relying on a federal agency in Washington D.C. to regulate a portion of 9-1-1 is practical or efficient.

- **HB 16-1338, Prohibition on Inquiring About Criminal Record (Monitor)**

HB 1338 prohibits advertising that no one with a criminal history may apply for a position, making any kind of inquiry about arrests or convictions until an interview or offer of employment has been tendered. The legislation was amended last week to exclude local governments.

- **HB 16-1439, Lodging & Entertainment Facility Liquor License (Monitor)**

In the liquor code, tavern licenses are issued to businesses whose primary business is the sale and service of alcoholic beverages for on premises consumption. In previous years, some local

licensing authorities and the state have issued tavern licenses to businesses such as bowling alleys and movie theaters. Technically, the only license that should have been available to those businesses is a beer and wine license, but once the wrong licenses were issued it became impossible to take them back. Additionally, those businesses are able to sell liquor under their tavern license, which they could not if they switched to a beer and wine license. In order to allow those businesses to retain the same model but allow them to have a proper license, the new lodging and entertainment license was proposed. Both types of facilities are defined in the bill and those with an existing tavern license would be required to convert them.

- **HB 16-1078, Local Government Employee Whistleblower Protection (Oppose)**

All public employees enjoy substantial protection of their free speech rights under the First Amendment to the United States Constitution. Federal jurisprudence ensures a balanced approach to weighing the employee's free speech rights with the employer's interests. The bottom line is that employees already enjoy substantial protection to complain about governmental wrongdoing. The balancing tests required by federal courts are something that HB 16-1078 woefully lacks. The League's current position paper on the bill is available [here](#); it was laid over in the House for second reading.
