Council follow-up

Resolution of action items or requests from previous meetings.

Councilman Douglas inquired about feasibility of lighting around the Fronterra Park site for safety

All neighborhood parks are planned with low level safety lighting. The north/south walking path through Fronterra Park has low-level lights, which also are located adjacent to shelters, restroom, and parking lot in compliance with the Land Development Code. Schools on either side of the park have lights adjacent to these edges of the park and the sidewalk perimeter is lit like other neighborhood sidewalks. Staff also discovered seven street lights were out of service in the general area (reported to United Power) that may have impacted perceived park lighting. An increased lighting level affects homeowners adjacent to the park and increases the likelihood the park would be used after hours and curfew. To illuminate all paths within Fronterra Park, staff estimates a total estimated cost of \$220,000 for 29 poles (\$7,500/ea.), exclusive of annual operation, maintenance and utility costs.

Councilman Douglas shared concerns with overwatering the landscaping on the corner of 113th Avenue and Chambers Road

Neighborhood Services staff inspected the area of E. 113th Avenue and Chambers Road and found no issues. However, the inspector found a broken sprinkler head in the landscape tract north of East 114th Avenue on the east side of Chambers Road and notified of the HOA of the issue. Furthermore, new seed and sod have been installed near 11392 Chambers Drive; contact was made with the owner who confirmed extensive irrigation is being used until sod is rooted and seed has sprouted. There are no violations with excess watering for new lawns.

Councilwoman Elliott stated drivers are making U-turns southbound U.S. 85 near the planters to avoid the seven-legged intersection and suggested additional barriers

This information and request has been passed on to CDOT for consideration. The Police Department will also monitor for possible enforcement.

Dick's Sporting Goods Park Noise Complaints

Attached is follow-up information requested by Councilman Amador to share at this week's Stapleton Advisory Board meeting regarding noise complaints the City has received related to Dick's Sporting Goods Park.

E. 72nd Avenue Improvements Project Update

In late-2014, the City was awarded a Safe Routes To School grant from CDOT for various sidewalk and pavement improvements along 72nd Avenue between Quebec Parkway and Highway 2. As such, review and approval of the project plans by CDOT and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) is necessary before bids can be solicited. During the final design approval process, several unexpected delays have been encountered. This has extended the project schedule by approximately seven weeks.

Staff currently anticipates that we will receive final approval from CDOT in late-July. Bidding would then occur followed by construction. A recommendation to award a contract will likely be forthcoming at the August 15, 2016 Council meeting. Construction would then take about 2 months to complete.

Chambers Multi-Use Trail & Bridge Project Update

Over the past several months staff has solicited two separate bids to construct the Chambers Road Multi-Use Trail & Bridge project. After the second bid staff contacted the lowest responsive bidder, Consolidated Resource, to discuss revision of their bid to remove the trail-related components and only construct the bridge elements of the project. After discussions with staff, review of the revised scope and reconsideration of bid prices, Consolidated Resource submitted a revised cost estimate. Review of this pricing and their list of additional concerns revealed to the project team that re-bidding the project yet again would likely yield more favorable bid results.

Staff has directed the project design engineer to revise the project plans to indicate a scope which is limited to the widening of the Second Creek Bridge. The project will be re-bid this week and a recommendation to award a contract will likely be forthcoming at the July 18 City Council meeting.

Councilman Douglas inquired about the left turn signal at southbound Highway 2 and eastbound Quebec Street in the evening rush hour.

Staff sat through several cycles and observed the left turn signal during the evening rush hour. At all times it appeared to be cycling normally and the left turn signal would be called up when a vehicle was present. Staff will continue to observe this movement for any problems.

Councilman Amador and Diaz noted a signal malfunction at Quebec Street and Prairie Parkway for further investigation

The City's contractor has corrected the problem.

Councilwoman Carson requested staff investigate signal timing on U.S. 85 from 104th to 120th Avenues

This request has been forwarded on to CDOT's Traffic Signal Management & Operations Group. Staff will report back on any findings or changes.

Councilman Amador noted the short left turn signal available for vehicles going westbound on 104th Avenue to southbound US-85

This request has been forwarded on to CDOT's Traffic Signal Management & Operations Group. Staff will report back on any findings or changes.

Councilman Douglas stated the timing for the southbound 104th Avenue turn signals to Highway 2 are still too short resulting in red light runners

Staff has made changes to the signal timing for the westbound left-turning vehicle phase at both 104th Avenue and 96th Avenue in the non-peak (non-rush hour) time periods. They are also set up to be permissive, i.e. a green ball, after the dedicated left turn phase is complete, so that vehicles can still turn if there is no oncoming traffic. Given the high levels of congestion on Highway 2 during rush hour periods, staff had recommended against doing any modifications to the left turn signal timing on 104th & 96th Avenues as it would restrict the available green time to the traffic on Highway 2.

Staff is planning a Traffic Signal study session for the Fall of 2016 with an overview on how traffic signals are warranted, how timings are established, and how changes are made, to help give City Council a better understanding of the elements that go into these traffic control devices.

Public Works hosts open house and "touch-a-truck" this Thursday

Public Works hosts its second annual open house and touch-a-truck this Thursday, June 16, from 4 to 8 p.m. at the Municipal Services Center. This free, family-friendly event includes food, games and music while giving residents a look at the equipment and facilities that allow public works staff to provide the services we all rely on. Kids can climb into city vehicles (such as a snow plow, backhoe, boom truck, etc.) and paint snow plow blades. A tour of the facility includes the sign-making shop, a look at the traffic operations center and informational stations on a variety of topics (such as construction projects, maintenance tips, water conservation, trash/recycling service and more). Held last year in conjunction with National Public Works Week in May, this year's event was moved to June due to weather concerns and school schedules. 

Greetings Stapleton/Northfield Residents:

District 5 Commander Ron Thomas and I visited recently with the Commerce City Police Department command staff to discuss the 2016 summer special events schedule at Dick's Sporting Goods Park, which is located at 60th and Quebec in Commerce City. Our agencies have a great working relationship and meet throughout the year to discuss crime trends, safety issues and special events taking place.

This summer will be particularly busy at Dick's Sporting Goods Park and the CCPD command staff has alerted us to several events that have the potential to cause traffic issues along Quebec and 56th Avenue, in addition to other issues associated with large crowds. The schedule of events is attached to this memo and we encourage you to review the dates and times, which might affect your afternoon or evening commute.

Besides the normal vehicle traffic concerns at these events, CCPD shared with us that they would be paying particular attention to the amount of noise and pedestrian traffic anticipated with the following high-profile events:

1. The July 4th Fest and Rapids game (5pm-11pm)
2. The BassNectar Concert, July 29 and July 30, 5pm-1am (this event includes outdoor camping, which is permitted on Dick's Sporting Goods Park property)
3. Phish Concert, September 2 through September 4, 8pm-1am (this event also includes camping on Dick's Sporting Goods Park property)
4. Luke Bryan Concert, September 9 and September 10, 7pm-1am

Rest assured that DPD District 5 and CCPD share the same concerns; the safety and well-being of our citizens during these events, the safe flow of vehicle traffic in and around the venue, and the amount of noise generated during each event. Our recent planning meeting with CCPD generated several ideas designed to limit the inconvenience that Stapleton/Northfield residents will encounter during these events, but we recognize the importance of including members of the community in the planning process. We understand this will affect you and your families and we would like to hear your concerns. We will be messaging this information to all the neighborhood organizations in the area, including SUN and our Neighborhood Watch representatives. We will collect all your comments and concerns, present them to CCPD, and work with them to identify plans that will have the least negative impact on your neighborhood.

(b) *Public health nuisance prohibited.* It shall be unlawful for any person to create any public health nuisance in the city or to permit a public health nuisance to occur or continue to occur on any property under such person's control. Further, it shall be unlawful for any person to permit a public health nuisance to occur in conjunction with any personal property under such person's control.

(Ord. No. 1848, § 1, 1-10-2011)

Sec. 6-2011. Unreasonable noise.

(a) *Unreasonable noise defined.* Any sound of such level and duration as to be or tend to be injurious to human health or welfare, or that would unreasonably interfere with the enjoyment of life or property, is deemed unreasonable. City agents are authorized to make a prima facie determination as to whether a noise is unreasonable, which determination may be based upon, but need not be limited to, a consideration of the following factors:

- (1) The time of day;
- (2) The size of any gathering of persons creating or contributing to the noise;
- (3) The neighborhood or area in which the noise is occurring;
- (4) The presence or absence of noise amplification equipment; and
- (5) Any other factors tending to show the magnitude and/or disruptive effect of the noise.

(b) *Unreasonable noise prohibited.* It shall be unlawful to make, continue or cause to be made or continued any unreasonable noise and no person shall knowingly permit such noise upon any premises or in or upon any vehicle owned or possessed by such person or under such person's control or operation. For purposes of this section, proof that the owner or occupant of the premises upon which the unreasonable noise occurred was present at the time of the violation shall constitute prima facie evidence that such person was in control of the premises and knowingly permitted the violation to occur.

(c) *Exemptions.* The limitations of this section shall not apply to:

- (1) Authorized emergency vehicles;
- (2) Construction equipment operating between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 8:00 p.m.;
- (3) Any activity that has been authorized by the city, through the zoning process, with a specific condition authorizing the exemption or variance from the requirements of this section;
- (4) Activities conducted or sponsored by the city;
- (5) Church or school chimes or bells; and
- (6) Events specifically exempted by the terms of a city permit or by the written authorization of the city manager.

Rules and Regulations

Prohibited Items – Bassnectar Concert Events

For the safety and security of our guests, the following items are NOT permitted into the facility:

- Weapons of any kind (i.e. knives, pepper spray, stun-guns, concealed weapons, firearms, spikes, chains, etc.) and any weapon accessories
- Fireworks, or any type of pyrotechnics
- Flammable products or materials and sprays
- Any missile / projectile like objects; Frisbees; Streamers of any kind
- Laser pointers/pens, any focus light beam devices
- LED gloves or LED microlights
- Massagers
- Large golf umbrellas or umbrellas with metal tips
- Large backpacks, suitcases, beach bags, equipment bags, etc.
- Hard case containers (coolers, briefcases, or containers of any size)
- Glass in any form, aluminum cans
- Outside food and beverages
- Outside alcohol
- Illegal drugs and paraphernalia
- Unsealed: cigarette packages, tampons, packs of gum, chapstick / lip gloss
- Electronic or vapor cigarettes that are not new factory sealed
- Vitamins
- Instruments
- Chemicals or illegal substances
- Water guns, water balloons, and / or any other kind of water projectile
- Glowsticks
- Gas masks or tactical clothing
- Eye drops; Pacifiers
- Vuvuzelas, Air horns or whistles of any kind
- Un-approved pamphlets, handouts, advertisements, etc.
- Stickers or flyers
- Markers, pens or spray paint
- Skateboards, roller blades, roller skates, roller shoes, etc.
- External flash camera units
- Interchangeable/detachable camera lens
- Audio/video recording devices including, but not limited to, Google Glass and other similar technology
- Camera monopods/bipods/tripods
- Professional cameras
- Selfie sticks
- Drones
- Animals (except service animals with paper work and bib)

- Stuffed animals or dolls
- Any item that can be used as a means to disturb the peace, endanger the safety of the crowd, and / or inflict damage to people or property.
- Other items as determined by facility management.

The following items ARE permitted into the facility:

- Factory sealed, clear plastic bottles measuring 20oz or less may be brought into the facility. Venue security will remove the caps upon entrance.
- Empty, clear plastic refillable bottles
- CamelBak-style water bladder systems. All bladder systems must be removable, transparent, and empty upon entrance inspection. Additionally, CamelBak-style bladder carriers may have no more than 2 main compartments and 1 small compartment.
- Soft-sided bags no larger than 12" x 12" x 12". All bags are subject to search prior to entry.
- Masks: All masks must be removable and are subject to search when entering the venue. Any masks that cannot be removed and/or searched will be denied entry by security.
- Totems -- all totems must be constructed in such a way as to not be considered a threat to public safety and venue security reserves the right to make the final determination about totems on a case-by-case basis.
- Prescription medications in original prescription bottle (with government-issued photo ID that matches name on printed prescription. Prescription bottles with mixed pills will be turned over to on-site medical representatives for final determination.
- Over the counter medications are allowed in provided that they are new and in the original, factory-sealed container.
- Costumes
- Earplugs
- Reusable (either battery-powered or rechargeable) light-up toys
- Face paint
- Hula hoops
- Non-profession digital and film cameras, including cellphone cameras
- Reasonable amount of inflatable toys
- Sealed: cigarette packages, packs of gum, tampons, and chapstick/lip gloss
- Lighters
- Guide dogs for persons with disabilities and other service animals

Management reserves the right to handle each occurrence on a case-by-case basis. There are no check-in areas or lockers available at the facility.

ALL bags, jackets and guests are subject to search and full pat down upon entering the facility. Any prohibited item that is surrendered to security at search points will not be returned. Venue security at the entrances reserve the right to make the final determination on allowed and prohibited items.

Allowed and Prohibited lists are subject to change without notice.

Camping Rates

- Camping passes - \$70 per person (additional service fees may apply)
 - This includes FREE parking in LOT R during the hours of operation noted below.
 - RV Passes - \$30 per RV (each person in the RV must also have a Camping Pass – additional service fees may apply).

Parking

Please take 56th avenue and turn north onto Valentia towards the stadium. Parking agents will direct you to the lot for camper vehicles (LOT R). Please note that camping at Dick's Sporting Goods Park is tent-only and cars are parked in a lot adjacent to the campground. You are welcome to take your car in/out of Lot R anytime you choose during the weekend. Cars are not allowed into the campground. No camping or sleeping in vehicles in the parking lots – security will be patrolling the parking lots.

Camping parking opens at 12:00 noon on July 29th, and closes at 12:00 noon on July 31st

RV's

- Each RV must have an RV pass and each person in the RV must have a camping ticket to enter RV parking.
 - The RV parking lots are enclosed inside the campground fence line.
 - RV Companion vehicles will also be parked in lot R – there is no space for them inside the actual campground. These cars can come and go throughout the weekend!
 - All RVs will be searched upon arrival and security reserves the right to make the final determination of allowed and prohibited items.
 - We will have an affordable service provider on site that will be able to refill your water tank and/or pump waste.

Campsites

Campsites are available on a first-come-first-served basis and are located on lush soccer fields close to the concert venue. Campers will be given specific wristband access to the camping area with unlimited re-entry. Searches will be done at all camping entrances at all times. Security reserves the right to make the final determination of allowed and prohibited items.

Each group will be allotted a 15 x 15 foot camp site. Guests looking to camp next to each other in adjacent camping spots must arrive together. Camping spots may not be held. There will not be a meet-up area past the tollbooths and pedestrian searches. Campers are allowed to visit other campsites within the campgrounds, however, guests that have not purchased camping are not allowed in the on-site campgrounds.

The venue and the promoters are not responsible for any lost, stolen, and/or misplaced items. It is recommended that you do not bring valuables of any kind. If you bring valuables, it is recommended that you lock them in your vehicle. Do not leave valuables in your campsite, and do not leave RVs unsecured in your RV site.

Camping opens at 12:00 noon on July 29th, and closes at 12:00 noon on July 31st. All Campers are expected to behave in a courteous manner.

Prohibited/Restricted Items

Prohibited items may be surrendered and are considered forfeited upon entry through the tollbooths and pedestrian search queues. Any surrendered items will not be returned regardless of whether or not a receipt is provided and/or statements made by any event personnel. You may elect to exit the tollbooth search prior to entering the campgrounds instead of surrendering any items. You may elect to request a refund instead of surrendering prohibited items.

Prohibited Items List:

- Weapons of any kind (i.e. knives, pepper spray, stun-guns, any concealed weapons, firearms, etc.)
- Fireworks of any kind
- Open fires or charcoal grills
- Nitrous oxide
- Balloons
- Outside chairs
- Golf carts or other motorized conveyances
- Bicycles, scooters, skateboards, hover boards, unicycles, stilts
- Glass containers of any kind
- Animals of any kind (except service animals with proper documentation and official bib)
- Laser Pointers
- Air horns
- Dust masks, Gas Masks
- Eye drops
- Spray Paint
- Open packs of cigarettes (upon entry)
- Chemicals

- Sponsorship-branded or wrapped vehicles are prohibited and will not be allowed entry through the RV tollbooths.
- Tents with sponsorship-branding or logos of any kind.
- Bulk alcohol over the amount in the Allowed Items, including kegs.
- Drugs or drug paraphernalia.
- Generators of any kind.
- Drones, remote-operated, and/or autonomous vehicles of any kind.
- Heating appliances of any kind.
- Amplified sound systems or instruments of any kind.
- Electronic/vapor cigarettes except as described in the Allowed Items.
- Tiki torches, fireworks, fuel, or incendiary devices of any kind.
- Focus light beam devices, including laser pointers.
- Any item that can be used as a means to disturb the peace, endanger the safety of the crowd, and/or inflict damage to people and goods.

Allowable Items List:

- General camping items not on the Prohibited Items list.
- Two (2) bulk alcohol items per person in aluminum or plastic containers only.
 - “Bulk alcohol” is defined as:
 - One (1) case (24 cans) of beer or malt-based beverage.
 - One (1) 1.75 litre plastic bottle of hard alcohol.
 - One (1) 4 litre box of wine.
- Cooking appliances under the following conditions.
 - Must bear a certification from a nationally-recognized certification agency.
 - Must only use propane as the only fuel.
 - Only one (1) cooking appliance per campsite.
 - Maximum amount of propane per campsite may not exceed 20 pounds.
 - Three feet (3ft) of clearance must be kept around the appliance at all times.
 - Appliances may only be used from 7AM-2AM.
 - When in-use, appliances may not be left unattended.
- Single-use, factory-sealed, non-refillable electronic/vapor cigarettes.
- Hula Hoops
- Prescription medications are allowed under the following conditions.
 - Must be in the original prescription bottle.
 - Guests with prescription medications must provide a government-issued photo ID that matches the name printed on the prescription container.
 - The description of the medication on the description printed on the prescription container.
 - Multiple prescription medications may not be mixed into a single container – each individual medication requires its own prescription container.
 - Medical personnel reserve the right to require guests to check in bulk amounts of prescription medication for the duration of the event -- please bring only what you need as per the prescription instructions.
- Over-the-counter medications are allowed in reasonable quantity provided they are new in the original factory-sealed container.

Additional camping passes, if available, will be sold at both entrances as well as at the Box Office, should a friend choose to join you! Subject to availability.

Children

Kids 12 and under are free to camp, but must be accompanied by a paying adult.

General Store

Our on-site General Store will be stocked and ready for you with dry and refrigerated goods, shower products and sundries. Hours TBD.

Lost and Found

All Lost and Found questions can be directed to Camping Headquarters, located at the Northwest corner of LOT E.

Medical Services

EMT's will be on-site 24 Hours a day. There will also be a first-aid station at the Northwest corner of LOT E.

Food and Beverage

Outside Food and Beverage is allowed into the campground including a reasonable amount of alcohol. Alcohol may only be brought through the tollbooths and pedestrian searches under the following conditions. Alcohol is for personal consumption only – no vending is allowed. All persons in possession of or in a vehicle with alcohol must be of legal drinking age. Alcohol amounts must be reasonable and in accordance with camping allowed and prohibited item guidelines.

There will be food, beverages, snacks and ice available for sale inside the campground. Please note alcohol is not for sale at the General Store.

Drinking Water

Multiple free drinking water stations are set up around the campground area. Please bring a reusable water bottle to fill up throughout the weekend and stay well hydrated.

ATMs

ATMs will be available inside the campground.

Showers

Showers will be available to all campers for a per use fee. Redeemable tokens are available for purchase inside the campgrounds at the HQ location. Showers are located in the Northwest corner of LOT D and open as follows

DEFINITIONS

Development Plan Approval:

Development approval usually is an administrative review of a development plan that covers the final details for site design, landscaping, architecture, and public improvements to ensure compliance with the development and design standards and provisions of the city's Land Development Code. A development plan should provide the character and layout of the lot or lots including the exact location; the use of each building and area; architectural elevations of buildings indicating height, materials, and color; detailed landscape plan; streets, curb cuts, lighting; utilities, drainage, and other easements.

Building Permit:

A building permit is the formal approval of building plans by Commerce City's building and safety division indicating they meet the requirements of prescribed codes. It is an authorization to proceed with the construction or reconfiguration of a specific structure at a particular site, in accordance with the approved drawings and specifications.

Certificate of Occupancy (CO)/Temporary Certificate of Occupancy (TCO):

A Certificate of Occupancy (CO) is a document issued by Commerce City's Building & Safety Division certifying a building's compliance with applicable building codes and other laws, and indicating it to be in a condition suitable for occupancy. This certificate is necessary to be able to occupy the structure for everyday use.

A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy (TCO) grants the same rights as a certificate of occupancy, however, it is only for a temporary period of time. Temporary certificate of occupancies are generally sought after and acquired when a building is still under minor construction, but there are certain areas that are deemed to be habitable, and, upon issuance of TCO, can legally be occupied or sold.

Grading Permit:

A grading permit is required for any excavation, fill, or other earthwork, unless the project is exempted by the Land Development Code. A grading permit may or may not be a precursor to additional construction activity.
