Mayor Pro Tem Bullock requested staff reach out to a resident that is interested in participating in the next Telephone Town Hall.

Staff contacted the resident last Wednesday and learned the individual's interest was in resolving code enforcement concerns. The neighborhood services division reached out to directly address stated issues.

Slurry Seal now underway in neighborhoods

As part of this year's pavement maintenance program, contractor A-One Chipseal began applying slurry seal treatment today in the Eagle Creek, River Oaks and Stillwater neighborhoods. Work in River Run (cul-de-sacs only) will start later this week and both Belle Creek and Dunes Park will be treated next week. Work is expected to last until about Oct. 24. An updated schedule with expected work dates for each of these neighborhoods is available now at c3gov.com/pavement.

All residents in these neighborhoods have received a mailed letter and emails will be sent to local HOAs to help alert residents about the impacts of this work. The contractor also will place street signage in these neighborhoods and each home is receiving a door hangar 24-48 hours prior to work occurring. Rep. Perlmutter's District Update – October 2016



I'm glad to be back home in Colorado after Congress was in session in September. Last week, both the House and Senate approved a 10-week **Continuing Resolution** to fund the government. This continues fiscal 2016 levels for programs through December 9 including \$1.1 billion in Zika funding, \$500 million in flood relief for Louisiana and other states, and full appropriations for Military Construction and Veterans Affairs.

Earlier in September, I introduced new legislation encouraging American businesses to fortify their systems and networks in an effort to mitigate the impact of cyber-attacks and data breaches. The **Data Breach Insurance Act** (H.R. 6032) provides a two-prong approach by providing a fifteen percent tax credit to companies who purchase data breach insurance coverage and adopt the [National Institute of Standards and Technology \(NIST\) Cybersecurity Framework](#) or any other standard approved by the Secretary of Treasury.

In 2014, there were 783 reported data breaches in the U.S. which exposed 85.6 million records, according to the Bipartisan Policy Center. The [average cost of a data breach is now \\$3.8 million](#), up from \$3.5 million a year ago, according to data security research organization, Ponemon. And [IBM estimates businesses are attacked an average of 16,856 times a year](#) – or 46 attacks on every business every day, nearly two attacks an hour.

Whether in the private sector or government sphere, hacks expose vulnerabilities and compromise our personal information including our financial records and identifications. They inconvenience our lives requiring new credit cards, credit monitoring and ID theft protection, and they can cost companies their reputations and billions of dollars. As more and more businesses become targets of cyber-attacks, it is more important than ever for them to be protected. That's why I'm introducing this legislation to help do more to prevent massive data breaches that compromise millions of American's private and personal information.

With the adoption of a cybersecurity framework preventing breaches on the front end and insurance to protect businesses on the back end, this legislation is incentivizing businesses to take the necessary steps to address this growing threat.

In terms of constituent services, my office recently worked with three families – two from Colorado – to get the bodies of their sons repatriated, **Levi Shirley from Arvada, Jordan MacTaggart from Castle Rock, and William Savage from Maryland** went overseas to fight ISIS. Though they did not fight as members of our armed forces, they were Americans and as Americans I believe we had a responsibility to bring these young men home and to give their families relief and closure. ONE YEAR LATER: AN UPDATE ON THE SUNCOR BOYS & GIRLS CLUB

Last fall when we opened the doors to the new Suncor Boys & Girls Club, we made a commitment to serve more kids and develop expanded programming that would positively impact the lives of kids and teens in Commerce City. The new freestanding Club has brought together the support, resources and encouragement kids need—all under one roof—thanks to your dedication and generosity. Together, we have been able to reach more kids and put them on the path to a great future.

We are excited to share highlights from the first year of operations, and we hope that you are proud of all that was accomplished in the 12 months since the Suncor Boys & Girls Club opened.

Programs & Highlights

Opening the new Suncor Boys & Girls Club substantially increased our capacity to serve kids and teens in the Commerce City area. In the school year prior to opening the new Club (2014-15), we served 382 Club members. During the 2015-16 school year however, our new Suncor Club provided out-school-time programs for 622 Commerce City youth. Young people who were unable to join the old school-based Club due to limited space and full capacity now have access to programs and opportunities that help them learn and grow long after the last school bell rings.



Our Clubs are open every day after school and during the weekdays throughout the summer, providing both a safe and supportive environment with engaging programs that focus on three key outcome areas: academic success and career readiness; character and leadership development; and health and wellness.



2015-2016 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Suncor Boys & Girls Club served 622 kids.
- Average daily attendance was 141 Club members.
- The new facility allowed us to serve 240 more Club members.*
- The Kitchen Community helped our Club members plant a Learning Garden.
- 12 teen Club members had the opportunity to go on a private tour of CBS4 as part of our Pathways to Success program, giving them the chance to explore careers in journalism.
- 35 youth attended our spring health programs, where they learned to resist peer pressure and make healthy decisions.

The new kitchen at the Suncor Boys & Girls Club allowed us to provide healthy cooking classes for our Club members and their families. Family activities at the Clubs provide a wonderful opportunity not only for parents to come to the Club and get a clear idea of what their child is doing while in our care, but also for our staff to build the trusting relationships with the families of our Club members that enable us to personalize our work with individual youth. We are glad to be able to provide more opportunities for parent engagement in our new space because when parents are deeply engaged in the success of their children, it leads to greater academic achievement and higher graduation rates.

A few other highlights from our first year of operations at the new facility include new strategies for teen recruitment and increased parent engagement. Getting teens to attend the Clubs frequently can be a challenge because, if we have done our jobs right, they are likely to be more highly

involved at their high schools. Last fall, Club staff from the Suncor Boys & Girls Club attended a community fair where they were able to talk with teens directly about what we do at the Clubs. This kind of outreach can be especially effective because it gives teens the opportunity to interact with staff, who can in turn provide candid, real-life insight into how coming to Boys & Girls Clubs can benefit teens.

One of the achievements related to our teen initiatives that we are most proud of is the launch of our new Pathways to Success program. The initiative offers a series of opportunities that help prepare our Club members to connect their education to employment in their particular field of interest. As an important component of the Pathways to Success program, we are providing our Club members with more opportunities to visit colleges, job shadow, and learn about their options. Through this program, dozens of teens at the Suncor Boys & Girls Club received the chance to explore careers in different fields.



Plans for the Future

We are now gearing up for the second phase of construction at our Suncor Boys & Girls Club. This second phase is part of our plan to enhance our programmatic offerings for our Club members through the addition of a new Youth Development Park with an additional 10,000 square feet at the site of our Suncor Club. Through a partnership with the Cal Ripkin Sr. Foundation, we will begin construction on a new synthetic turf field this fall. The field will allow our Club members the opportunity to play baseball, softball, soccer, and football. This Youth Development Park will not only enhance our own programs but the Commerce City community as well.



Meet Club Member Hadamarys

You may remember Hadamarys. She has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club for as long as she can remember. She started visiting the school-based Club in Commerce City when she turned eight—the first year that she was able to become a member. Throughout her many years spent at the Club, her involvement has gone far and beyond. She's been a keynote speaker at events and has been highlighted for her heavy involvement. Now that the new Club is open, 15 year-old Hadamarys is continuing to thrive. She's able to grow up and spend her teenage years in the modern, spacious facility with a massive teen center.

“The Club has always opened up new doors for me. It has kept me on track and out of trouble. I am on the right track to go to college, to succeed and to become a better person. I would not be where I am today without the Boys & Girls Club.”

Hadamarys believes that the Club has given her a support system that she could not have gotten anywhere else. If she's having trouble with her homework, she knows she can always get help from a staff member. If she ever has personal problems, she knows she can count on the positive adult mentors in the Clubs to give her advice and help her out.

Hadamarys does not follow in other people's paths. She makes her own by following her passions and pushing herself to get anything she wants with hard work—qualities that Hadamarys attributes to lessons learned at the Boys & Girls Club. Because of the Club, Hadamarys understands the value of education and has visited countless colleges. She aspires to go to college and graduate with a degree in Criminal Justice.
