Council follow-up

Resolution of action items or requests from previous meetings.

Temporary Traffic Signal – 96th Avenue and Buckley Road

Staff has received several more complaints about the operation of the temporary traffic signal for the Tower Road Widening project detour at 96th Avenue and Buckley Road. The contractor has observed that sometimes the signal controller “misses” vehicles in the left turn lane, not activating the left turn phase during morning hours. This could be attributable to a sun glare problem with the detection camera. The contractor has set the signal to work on a pre-timed cycle from 4:30 – 8 a.m. and adjusted the cycle lengths to allow the east and westbound movements to run slightly longer. Staff will monitor this new condition to see if we continue to experience problems.

Councilman Douglas requested staff investigate the installation of a flashing beacon pedestrian crossing, similar to the one at 106th Avenue & Landmark Drive in the area of E 114th Place and Oakland St. and E. 112th Avenue and Oakland St

The Police Department's Thimmig School Resource Officer conducted directed patrol over several days in the area of E 114th Place and Oakland St. and E. 112th Avenue and Oakland St. During this directed patrol, the department observed no issues inside the school zone or around the roundabout area nor did they observe any speed or pedestrian violations. The officer also noted that while E. 112th Avenue is a wide roadway with a speed limit of 45 mph, there were no observed difficulties with pedestrians crossing the roadway.

There is an existing, marked crosswalk on the east leg of the intersection of 112th Avenue and Oakland Street, with pedestrian crossing signage. A rapid flashing beacon (RFB) system could be installed at this location. If desired, the city also would need to install a curb ramp at the southeast corner of the intersection to provide access from the existing sidewalk to the street.

Councilman Diaz and Outlook neighborhood residents expressed concerns about safe pedestrian access to the new Villages East Park. Council members also inquired about an improved crossing from the Villages at Buffalo Run West development to the park.

There currently is no curb on the northeast corner of 120th and Chambers and there is no sidewalk that runs on the east side of Chambers south of 120th. The attached memo outlines staff's research, schedule and a \$35,000 cost estimate (excluding staff time) for the project. The city manager's office will proceed with implementation using remaining contingency funds from the Villages East project, with delivery in February 2017, weather permitting.

Subject: Chambers Road Sidewalk Improvements

In August 2016, Councilmember Diaz submitted a request from a citizen regarding sidewalk access to the new park at the Villages at Buffalo Run as there is no curb on the northeast corner of 120th and Chambers and there is no sidewalk that runs on the east side of Chambers south of 120th. He also asked to investigate the possibility of installing a crosswalk or light around Jasper. Two citizens also attended the September 19, 2016 City Council meeting to express a desire for better pedestrian access from the Outlook neighborhood.


Per the City's Land Development Code, adjacent development is responsible for installing sidewalks along all roadways, as the property is developed. Sidewalks currently are in place on the north side of 120th Avenue at both Chambers Road and Jasper Street. However, there is a "gap" of between 50-80 feet at each location from the end of the sidewalk to the corner of 120th Avenue. Presumably, staff allowed the developer to not extend the sidewalk to the corner as 120th Avenue would be widened at some time in the future to a 4-lane road. South of 120th Avenue, there is no sidewalk on Chambers Road between 120th Avenue and E. 119th Avenue. On Jasper Street, there is sidewalk on both sides of the street, south of 120th Avenue.

Although there would be less sidewalk to construct along Jasper Street to provide pedestrians a route from the Outlook neighborhood to the new park, crossing 120th Avenue at this location is not recommended due to the volume & speed of vehicles. Instead, staff would recommend a route from the Outlook neighborhood along 121st Avenue to Chambers Road and then along the east side of Chambers Road to 120th Avenue. At 120th Avenue, pedestrians could utilize the existing traffic signal and marked crosswalks to cross 120th Avenue. South of 120th Avenue, there is no sidewalk currently in place between 120th

Avenue to 119th Avenue. From there, sidewalk exists to the corner of the park at 117th Avenue.



The total length of missing sidewalk along this path is approximately 635 lineal feet. Staff proposes to construct new sidewalk north of 120th Avenue (red) and a soft-surface, gravel path (white) south of 120th Avenue. Some curb & gutter, and new pedestrian ramps will also be required to construct these improvements.



The City Council also requested that staff investigate the possibility of providing a RFB (rapid flashing beacon) system to cross Chambers Road from the Villages at Buffalo Run West development to the park. Staff evaluated this request and determined that the intersection of 117th Avenue would provide a better crossing point than 116th Avenue as it is in closer proximity to more homes on the west side of Chambers Road and provides adequate sight lines. Crosswalk markings on the

pavement would also need to be installed at this location. No median refuge would be provided on Chambers Road.

Staff has confirmed that adequate right-of-way is currently available to construct all of these improvements.

Project Costs

There are four elements of the project that will require funding:

1. Sidewalk, Curb & Gutter, Pedestrian Ramps

As a part of the 2016 Concrete Flatwork project, the costs for the curb & gutter, new sidewalk, and pedestrian ramps were included in the project to obtain actual costs. The actual bid price was \$17,322.50. With a 5% contingency, the cost is estimated to be \$18,189.

2. RFB System

The RFB system consisting of two solar poles, signage, and beacons is estimated to cost \$12,300 for materials & installation. Public Works staff would install the marked crosswalks at a cost of \$500.

3. Soft Surface Gravel Path

Public Works staff would install the soft surface path using existing forces. Crushed Class VI material would be purchased to facilitate a smoother surface that can be easily compacted. The cost for these materials is estimated to be \$2,500.

4. Maintenance & Snow Removal Costs (On going)

Public Works staff would be required to maintain the path until such time as the sidewalk is constructed in its permanent configuration. PRG Department does not maintain soft surface trails in the right-of-way. Costs are difficult to estimate but would likely require about \$500 of materials annually and approximately 15-25 hours of labor annually.

Project Schedule

The concrete flatwork contract is scheduled to be completed by December 23, 2016. Installation of the RFBs would take place once the equipment is received. These typically take 6-8 weeks to receive. The soft surface trail would be constructed as weather & staff resources allow.

All work could likely be completed by February 2017, depending on weather.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends proceeding with the project, as indicated, if available funding can be identified.

ONE YEAR LATER: AN UPDATE ON THE SUNCOR BOYS & GIRLS CLUB

Last fall when we opened the doors to the new Suncor Boys & Girls Club, we made a commitment to serve more kids and develop expanded programming that would positively impact the lives of kids and teens in Commerce City. The new free-standing Club has brought together the support, resources and encouragement kids need—all under one roof—thanks to your dedication and generosity. Together, we have been able to reach more kids and put them on the path to a great future.

We are excited to share highlights from the first year of operations, and we hope that you are proud of all that was accomplished in the 12 months since the Suncor Boys & Girls Club opened.

Programs & Highlights

Opening the new Suncor Boys & Girls Club substantially increased our capacity to serve kids and teens in the Commerce City area. In the school year prior to opening the new Club (2014-15), we served 382 Club members. During the 2015-16 school year however, our new Suncor Club provided out-school-time programs for 622 Commerce City youth. Young people who were unable to join the old school-based Club due to limited space and full capacity now have access to programs and opportunities that help them learn and grow long after the last school bell rings.



Our Clubs are open every day after school and during the weekdays throughout the summer, providing both a safe and supportive environment with engaging programs that focus on three key outcome areas: academic success and career readiness; character and leadership development; and health and wellness.

The new kitchen at the Suncor Boys & Girls Club allows us to provide healthy cooking classes for our Club members and their families. Family activities at the Clubs provide a wonderful opportunity not only for parents to come to the Club and get a clear idea of what their child is doing while in our care, but also for our staff to build the trusting relationships with the families of our Club members that enable us to personalize our work with individual youth. We are glad to be able to provide more opportunities for parent engagement in our new space because when parents are deeply engaged in the success of their children, it leads to greater academic achievement and higher graduation rates.

A few other highlights from our first year of operations at the new facility include new strategies for teen recruitment and increased parent engagement. Getting teens to attend the Clubs frequently can be a challenge because, if we have done our jobs right, they are likely to be more

involved at their high schools. Last fall, Club staff from the Suncor Boys & Girls Club attended a community fair where they were able to talk with teens directly about what we do at the Clubs. This kind of outreach can be especially effective because it gives teens the opportunity to interact with staff, who can in turn provide candid, real-life insight into how coming to Boys & Girls Clubs can benefit teens.

One of the achievements related to our teen initiatives that we are most proud of is the launch of our new Pathways to Success program. This initiative offers a series of opportunities that help prepare our Club members to connect their education to employment in their particular field of interest. As an important component of Pathways to Success, we are providing our Club members with more opportunities to visit colleges, job shadow, and learn about their options. Through this program, dozens of teens at the Suncor Boys & Girls Club received the chance to explore careers in different fields.



Plans for the Future

We are now gearing up for the second phase of construction at our Suncor Boys & Girls Club. This second phase is part of our plan to enhance our programmatic offerings for our Club members through the addition of a new Youth Development Park with an additional 10,000 square feet at the site of our Suncor Club. Through a partnership with the Cal Ripkin Sr. Foundation, we will begin construction on a new synthetic turf field this fall. The field will allow our Club members the opportunity to play baseball, softball, soccer, and football. This Youth Development Park will not only enhance our own programs but the Commerce City community as well.



Meet Club Member Hadamarys

You may remember Hadamarys. She has been a member of the Boys & Girls Club for as long as she can remember. She started visiting the school-based Club in Commerce City when she turned eight—the first year that she was able to become a member. Throughout her many years spent at the Club, her involvement has gone far and beyond. She's been a keynote speaker at events and has been highlighted for her heavy involvement. Now that the new Club is open, 15 year-old Hadamarys is continuing to thrive. She's able to grow up and spend her teenage years in the modern, spacious facility with a massive teen center.
