

Mile High Greyhound Park redevelopment reaches major milestone

Urban renewal plan approval allows development process to move forward

REDEVELOPMENT OF THE FORMER MILE HIGH GREYHOUND PARK took an important step forward in June with approval of the urban renewal plan by city council and the Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority (URA) board. The master developer for the site, REGen, LLC, can now secure financing, finalize agreements with individual developers to build homes and commercial buildings, and continue with the normal development process. Residents could see new activity on the property later this year as construction gets underway on roads, utilities and drainage facilities.

Located between E. 62nd and E. 64th avenues from Holly Street to Highway 2, the 65-acre property was purchased by the URA in 2011 to make sure it was redeveloped as a benefit to the community. Resident input helped create the current vision of a vibrant, mixed-use development featuring retail stores, restaurants, office space, an educational facility and various types of residences. These will likely include single-family homes, townhomes and senior housing. The project also includes parks, other green spaces and improved regional drainage. The Suncor Boys and Girls Club opened in 2015 on 2.5 acres of land donated by the URA at the southeast corner of the property.

The site is now officially identified as an urban renewal area and eligible to use tax increment financing, or TIF, to help the developer cover the cost of building infrastructure on the property (learn more about TIF in the Spotlight on the Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority on page 5). Due to state legislation passed in 2015, completing the urban renewal plan required nearly a year of conversations to create agreements with other agencies that collect taxes from the site (including Adams 14 School District, Adams County and the South Adams County Fire District) and allow the use of TIF for the project.

Updated zoning unique to the site was approved in January 2017 to guide the development process and identify land uses for each specific portion of the property. REGen will now secure financing for the development, finalize engineering designs (for elements such as roads and drainage facilities) and work toward completing the initial land sale agreements with private builders. Infrastructure construction is currently scheduled to begin by the end of this year, with construction of the first residential units set for 2019.

Fireworks are illegal in the city

You are not allowed to possess, make, use or sell fireworks - even small sparklers – within city limits or in city parks. Jail and substantial fines are possible for violating the fireworks ban. On June 18, city council increased the city's fines to \$500 for a first offense and \$750 for a second.

To report the use of fireworks in your neighborhood, call the non-emergency dispatch line at 303-288-1535. Fireworks complaints will be given priority in the period around July 4. Do not call 911 to report fireworks violations, since this could slow down response times for life-threatening emergencies.

Residents are invited to enjoy one of Colorado's largest professional fireworks displays at the annual 4thFest outside Dick's Sporting Goods Park. The event starts at 5 p.m., with the fireworks display starting after the Colorado Rapids game.

Introducing Commerce City's new CCTV8

After nearly 20 years partnering with the Adams 14 School District to provide programming for the local Channel 8 television station, the city took over responsibility for all content on Channel 8 in late June. Adams 14 programming has now moved to Channel 22, giving both agencies their own channel to share content and broadcast TV programs to the community.

The new CCTV8 airs city council meetings, city messages and information about various topics, and shows about cooking, fitness, senior health, youth enrichment and more. Channel 8 is a PEG (public, educational and government) access channel available through a franchise agreement with cable provider Comcast. Through this agreement, Comcast pays the city a small portion of its revenue to be used for equipment costs.

Recent interest in oil and gas development sparks citywide conversation

City Council gathering information to decide city's approach

OIL AND GAS DEVELOPMENT IS SUDDENLY A POPULAR TOPIC IN COMMERCE CITY, as the area has started receiving significant interest from industry operators in just the past few months. While the city has not yet received any applications for city oil and gas permits, dozens of applications are pending at earlier stages of the permitting process with the state agency that oversees all oil and gas development, the Colorado Oil and Gas Conservation Commission (COGCC).

The COGCC is responsible for regulating most aspects of oil and gas drilling in Colorado, including underground activity. The city's authority for regulating these activities is largely limited to certain surface impacts due to COGCC regulations and state law. The city updated its land development code in 2012 to address the impacts of oil and gas operations and is currently working on additional updates to its regulations.

Since 2012, state law and regulations have changed and many court cases have influenced the way cities have chosen to deal with oil and gas operations. Some area cities have imposed strict limitations on oil and gas development and others have attempted to ban it completely, with varied and limited success.

City Council discussed the option of a six-month moratorium on new oil and gas activity at the June 4 meeting, but declined to enact that ordinance to study the matter further. Presentations on the topic are planned for council's July 9 study session, which will be held in council chambers and streamed live online at c3gov.com/video. Regular updates on oil and gas activity are scheduled for the regular meeting on the third Monday of each month. Presentations from various subject matter experts are also being planned.

To serve the community's interest in oil and gas activity and help keep residents informed, the city's website includes information on current applications and points visitors to external resources. At c3gov.com/oilgas, residents can find applications pending with the COGCC and the city's responses, the locations of proposed sites and links to provide public comment to the state.

Summer learning loss occurs when students lose more than two months of what they learned during the school year in reading and math because they stop learning over the summer. If this happens throughout elementary school, a student can end up more than 2.5 years behind by the end of fifth grade. The gap widens even more during high school.

What does Adams 14 do?

Thanks to the Adams 14 team, we are trying to prevent that gap from widening by providing Summer of Learning programming to help our students. This three-week summer school offers students the opportunity to be engaged, challenged, and learn through hands-on experiences in both reading and math.

Resources are in both English and Spanish and include topics such as social-emotional learning, understanding grade level expectations, reading and math tips for parents and even practice tests to ensure your child is on track to graduate.

Top 5 ways to protect yourself from mosquito-borne illness this summer

- 1. Eliminate breeding habitat by draining ALL standing water on your property (don't forget about gutters, flower pots, toys, buckets, trash cans, tires, etc.)
- 2. Limit outdoor activity around dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active
- 3. Dress in long sleeves and pants
- 4. Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing
- 5. Use mosquito repellents containing DEET

The city's mosquito management program also takes steps to reduce residents' risk of exposure to West Nile virus (WNV) and other illnesses. The program helps cut mosquito populations by reducing habitat, eliminating larvae, trapping and testing mosquitoes and - if necessary - adult mosquito spraying. City contractor Vector Disease Control International (www.vdci.net/colorado) uses methods which maximize effectiveness without compromising the safety of residents, pets or the environment.

While Zika virus has become a major concern in some parts of the world, experts say Colorado's climate makes it extremely unlikely Zika could be contracted from mosquitoes here. If you plan on traveling to an area where Zika is a risk, visit cdc.gov/zika for more information on the virus.

Be a Good Neighbor this Summer

- Cut weeds and grass to a height of 8 inches or less.
- Keep public sidewalks clear of grass and bushes. Tree limbs should be trimmed to at least 10 feet above sidewalks and 15 feet above streets.
- Items not intended to be stored outside, such as furniture and tires, are not permitted to be stored in public view (even if covered).
- Vehicles that are unlicensed, inoperable or have expired plates must be stored in a fully enclosed structure.
- Trash should be stored in a designated garbage can or proper receptacle until collection, not scattered across your property.

Revitalizing neighborhoods with the Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority

Editor's note: This monthly feature highlights the different boards, commissions and other quasi-governmental organizations in Commerce City.

The growth and decline of neighborhoods can be a natural part of a city's evolution. When businesses close or residents move out of a historic area, encouraging new investment and preventing blight in that neighborhood can prove to be a difficult task. This is why the Commerce City Urban Renewal Authority (URA) exists.

The URA creates public-private partnerships to help revitalize neighborhoods where private investment is unlikely to do so on its own. Redeveloping older properties or neighborhoods can bring with it significant costs that discourage developers from taking on projects in those locations. Since creating new uses on abandoned, unmaintained and unsightly properties benefits the surrounding community, the city can use urban renewal to make those projects more financially attractive to developers or acquire parcels of land needed for a project.

While the majority of the investment in urban renewal projects still comes from private investors, urban renewal uses a financial incentive known as tax increment financing (TIF) to fill a gap in the difference between costs and expected revenues. As property values rise due to new construction and economic activity in an urban renewal area, TIF captures the extra tax money that is generated to help pay back the cost of the infrastructure construction or environmental cleanup that was necessary to make the project possible.


The Mile High Greyhound Park redevelopment project (see page 1 for details) is one example of how this process can work. Because the needed roads, water/sewer lines and other utilities do not currently exist on the site, the revenue from TIF will help the developer pay for the construction of that infrastructure. Without the use of TIF, a developer would be asked to take on much more financial risk and the redevelopment project being envisioned probably would not happen.

Other designated urban renewal projects in Commerce City include ongoing efforts in the Derby Downtown District, the City Plaza/Parkway Market Shopping Centers (E. 62nd Avenue and Parkway Drive) and the Victory Crossing development (east of Quebec Parkway and south of the Rocky Mountain Arsenal National Wildlife Refuge).

Commerce City's URA board consists of 12 members, including the nine members of city council and representatives from Adams 14 School District, Adams County and the South Adams County Fire District. In 2015, SACFD introduced naming apparatus honoring local fallen military heroes. This year was an exception when one of our two new ladder trucks was dedicated to Adams County Sheriff's Deputy Heath Gumm who was killed in the line of duty in January 2018. On May 24, 2018 at Station 24 we honored the dedication to Deputy Gumm where members of his family, Adams County Sheriff and community were present and assisted with the traditional wash down and drying of the truck before going into service. Jim Gumm father of Heath is a retired West Metro Fire Rescue Firefighter did the honors and the first to drive the truck following the wash down. Many members of SACFD worked alongside Deputy Gumm and also played hockey with him for several years. Our 2nd ladder truck dedicated to fallen US Army Private First Class William C. Markle of Commerce City, Colorado who was killed in Vietnam while serving in the United States Army and is honored on Panel 33E, Row 3 of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. On 30 Dec 1967 four men from A Company, 4th Bn, 23rd Infantry, were killed during an artillery/mortar attack, Sgt. Richard G. Godbout, Manchester, NH, Pfc. Scott H. Cook, Pacific, MO., Pfc. William C. Markle, Commerce City, CO., and Pfc. Wylie O. Phillips, Kershaw, SC. It is with great honor and pride to have this dedication for those that haven given their lives serving our country and community!



Update on the Centralized **Pellet Softening System**

The project is currently in the design phase, which is expected to be completed by the end of this year. Construction is expected to begin in early 2019. The construction is estimated to take 18 months with the goal of the centralized treatment plant being operational in late 2020. A few months before the system is fully operational, customers will be notified of the anticipated start date for the centralized treatment system, what hardness levels they can expect, and what a customer should consider regarding the potential continued use of in-home treatment systems. More information about the notification regarding the softening treatment will be available as the project completion date gets closer. The pellet softening treatment is a centralized treatment system that will treat the water for every customer in the district and will therefore affect all residents at once.
